History of Gin Through Scottish Distilleries

In the 16th century juniper based spirits were being distilled in Holland, eventually making their way over to England by the 17th century, taking many guises through the Gin Craze of the mid 1700s, to the passing of the Gin Act in 1751, and the boom of illicit Gin Joints. Then the birth of the copper pot still helped bring around the more recognisable gin as we know them today.

Old Tom Gin	£4.40
<i>Sweet citrus style of gin from the 1700s House of Elrick ~ Aberdeenshire</i>	
Navy / Plymouth Dry Gin	£5.10
<i>1793 Plymouth distilled the first dry style on gin in the UK, Navy strength being high in alcohol. Over 1000 barrels a year were supplied to the British Navy by the Plymouth distillery Avva Navy Strength 57.2% ~ Elgin</i>	
London Dry Gin	£3.50
<i>In the 1800s the London Dry Gin style was conceived. Generally citrus heavy but juniper led and of few ingredients Caorunn Gin ~ Grantown-on-Spey</i>	
Fruit Gin	£3.25
<i>Although adding fruit to distillates is not a new phenomenon, the 2000s has seen a vast increase in the gin market as the spirit is able to balance sweet and dry flavours well. Hills & Harbour Pineapple & Orange ~ Newton Stewart</i>	
Craft Gin	£3.90
